MESSAGE FROM SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Banded Peak School is nestled in the shadows of beautiful Kananaskis County with the soaring mountains to the West and the rolling foothills to the South and to the East. At Banded Peak we are a safe and nurturing community who engage and challenge learners to think, to take risks, to collaborate and to become confident, independent, life long learners who contribute as resilient, caring, global-minded citizens. Students at Banded Peak engage in diverse programming to enable them to become self-directed, innovative, ecologically intelligent and entrepreneurial.

Teachers at Banded Peak School work to provide learning opportunities that both challenge and motivate students to learn, but which are appropriately balanced to ensure that literacy and mathematical benchmarks are attained for each student. Students experience the curriculum from kindergarten through to grade eight with teachers who seek to provide real-life, authentic learning opportunities. Opportunities which have allowed students to interact with local politicians and media, engage in profound discussion with business and community stakeholders, and experience our wondrous natural spaces, both adjacent to the school or surrounded by towering peaks in the Rocky Mountains.

As we review our school's performance through the development of our Annual Results Report (SARR) we are pleased with the affirmation we have received from our community. In particular it is encouraging that stakeholders recognize the school's efforts to provide students with challenging, engaging, and authentic learning experiences. In addition, we are pleased with the level of satisfaction from parents, students and staff in relation to our school being a caring and nurturing environment in which students flourish. Perhaps most noticeable in the development our SARR is the overall satisfaction with the improvement in the quality of education at Banded Peak School (94.5%). Despite the overall success of our program we recognize that we must continue to work diligently to involve parents in the school; not only as valued volunteers, but also as meaningful allies in the work that we endeavor to accomplish. We recognize that ongoing communication of student learning and student achievement is important to parents and we must continue to involve our community in this partnership.

We are excited about the opportunities and challenges that each school year affords us. We look forward to working collaboratively with our community partners, parents, students and teachers to continue to improve teaching and learning at Banded Peak School, the "gem in the woods".

OVERVIEW OF ACHIEVEMENTS

Goal One – Learners have their individual needs met

Students at Banded Peak School are provided the resources, tools and services to meet their individual social, emotional, and learning needs. Through the development of an overarching system, both throughout the school and the school division, students have access to timely, ongoing, and continued support to ensure success. Students at Banded Peak frequently participate in activities such as "House Leagues", band, sports teams, and various before and after school clubs including, Knitting Club, Climbing Club and Cross-Country Running Club. These activities provide students with new and exciting outlets, which facilitate social development and heighten awareness and appreciation of sport and school culture.

In addition, students at Banded Peak School are provided extensive wrap around services to further facilitate learning and ensure individual success. Our learning support team consists of an early literacy teacher, learning support teacher, Child Development Advisor (CDA) and our administrative team. To support reading and writing with our emergent learners (kindergarten, grade one, grade two) our early literacy teacher works in collaboration with teachers to identify, assess and support all students. The learning support team at Banded Peak is responsible for ensuring that the unique learning needs of all students are met. Through ongoing collaboration, problem solving and planning our team identifies strategies to support each child. Finally, our Child Development Advisor provides one to one, small group and whole classroom support for each child through direct intervention strategies and coaching. Acting as the liaison between home and school the role of our CDA is to facilitate social and emotional growth in our students.

Through the responses on both the Accountability Pillar Online Report Initiative (APORI) administered by Alberta Education and the Rocky View Schools Satisfaction Survey students, parents, and teachers are pleased with the efforts being made to ensure that the learning needs of children at Banded Peak are met. Overall indications (89.7% on the APORI) suggested satisfaction with the ability of students to access programs and support in a timely fashion. This represents a continued improvement over the past four years where satisfaction has increased from a 75% to the current 89.7%, a number that surpasses the provincial average of 84.2%. Of particular note is student satisfaction (100% n=29) with the school's ability to provide support for students with school work related questions and parental satisfaction with student ability to access programs that are not school related (80% n=10). These results are further echoed through RVS survey data, which suggests that 89% of parents, 97% of students, and 93% of teachers are satisfied with the ability of the school to provide for all learners, an increase of over 40% from 2011/2012 and 10% over the previous school year

In addition, we are pleased that students, parents, and staff appreciate the caring, nurturing environment at Banded Peak School. Results suggest (96.3% n=95 APORI) satisfaction with the schools ability to provide a safe and caring learning environment for children. This reflects an increase of 2% over the previous school year and surpasses the provincial average of 89.2%. Of particular note is parental satisfaction with the school's ability to provide a safe and caring environment, where parents specified on all five indicators overwhelming support for the school (90% to 100% APORI). These results are echoed on RVS Satisfaction survey where 87.58% of respondents reported satisfaction with school programming related to "Safe and Caring".

Goal Two – Learners are self-directed, innovative, ecologically intelligent and entrepreneurial.

At Banded Peak School we strive, through diverse and engaging programing, to provide opportunities for our community of learners to become self-directed, innovative, ecologically intelligent and entrepreneurial. Students are challenged to not simply produce a response, but rather to engage in their work, by asking informed questions, thinking critically, and eventually arriving at a deeper understanding of material. Each of our teachers, from Kindergarten through to Grade Eight seeks to provide students with an authentic and balanced approach to learning. In their formative years students are introduced to a various learning strategies, structures, and programs from Daily Five, to Lively Letters, to the Power of Ten, designed to empower them in their learning and assist them in becoming self-directed learners. These supports are offset by the opportunities that teachers provide students to develop their 21st Century competencies. Opportunities which include the school's participation in Rocky View Schools' Cohorts, the use of inquiry learning, and the frequent access of all classrooms to our outdoor spaces. As students gain confidence in their learning they are further challenged to begin developing their understanding of their important role in our world. Through exposure to authentic learning experiences, collaboration with others, and experience in our natural space, Banded Peak students gain a profound confidence in their learning.

Survey results indicate that parent, student and teacher satisfaction with the overall quality of education at Banded Peak School remains high with 94.5% (APORI) of respondents (n=95) suggesting that the quality of education has improved. This number represents a slight increase over the previous year (92.4%) and surpasses the provincial average of 89.5%. In relation to the improvement of the school over the past three years, 91.5% of respondents were favorable in their responses, an improvement over the previous year's 84.6% and the provincial average of 79.6%. These results are further echoed by students in both grades 4-6 who indicate 95% satisfaction and students in grade 7-8 who indicate 83% satisfaction with overall school improvement.

In addition, student, parent and teacher satisfaction on the Rocky View Schools Accountability Pillar remains high with a three year rolling average of over 90%. Overall satisfaction with measures such as the degree of student ownership over their learning (90.86%) and learners demonstrating 21st competencies (94.10%) remain high and continue to surpass other Rocky View Schools. Results further indicate overall satisfaction by students in relation to the level of satisfaction towards teachers making class interesting (90%), the overall use of technology to support learning (96%), and that teachers use a variety of ways to help students learn (88%). This is further echoed by parental satisfaction that students are learning to become critical, creative and complex thinkers (91%) and that the school provides students with activities that promote responsible citizenship, volunteerism and community service (100%).

Goal Three – Instructional design challenges and engages each learner.

Banded Peak School continues to demonstrate a high degree of success in relation to instructional design and student engagement. By providing students authentic, balanced, and challenging learning experiences we strive to capture the imagination and passion of our students. These experiences are peppered throughout the school and include projects such as "Change Makers" which seeks to empower students to make change through action; "Engaged in Elections" which sought to increase student awareness of the importance of informed voting; and "What About a Forest?" which sought to inform students about the process and impacts of logging in Bragg Creek and Maclean Creek. In addition to these large-scale inquiry projects, students are provided

balanced classroom instruction to ensure that both literacy and mathematical benchmarks are attained.

As we examine our survey results we are encouraged by overall student, parent, and teacher satisfaction with our program. In particular aggregate responses on the Rocky View Schools' survey suggest an overall satisfaction with instructional design at 94.66%, an increase of 0.86% over the previous school year. This is echoed by parental satisfaction with the ability of teachers to provide real-life, meaningful experiences to help students learn (100%) and student satisfaction with the variety of programming available to them (97%). In addition, we are highly encouraged by parental satisfaction on the APORI survey, which suggests overall satisfaction with both the challenging nature of school (93%) and the interest that their child has in school (93%). Both responses represent an increase of 10% over the previous school year and in latter case a 33% increase over two years.

Goal Four – Learning environments enable the acquisition of 21st C Competencies.

Banded Peak School continues to demonstrate improvement in its ability to enable the acquisition of 21st century competencies. It is our goal to continue to engage students across grades with authentic, balanced and meaningful learning opportunities supported by our talented team of professionals and an effective array of digital tools and computers. Aggregate responses to Rocky View Schools' Accountability Pillar Survey suggest that overall satisfaction with the school's ability to provide for students is increasing. Results suggest overwhelming support by students, parents and teachers towards the use of digital technologies as a means to enhance student learning with 94.57% of respondents satisfied. This is further echoed by a parental satisfaction rate of 91% towards the school's ability to provide learning via online tools that extend beyond the traditional school day. This represents an increase of close to 30% when compared to the 2011/2012 school year. In addition, staff satisfaction remains high with 100% of respondents pleased with their ability to improve learning opportunities through the use of technology and 100% satisfaction with the resources and supports provided in building 21st Century learning environments.

PRIORITY AREAS FOR FUTURE SCHOOL EDUCATION PLANS

Goal One – Learners are successful.

Through hard work, determination, and with the support of our professional team, students at Banded Peak School "strive to be the best that [they] can be". Their individual success is in part supported by the school's commitment to build a strong foundation in both literacy and numeracy for each child. Through the allocation of additional funds and resources to our early literacy and language arts programs we are working to establish protocols and procedures to further support student learning throughout the school. This work may been seen in our grades three and four Book Club which provides flexible group opportunities for readers, through Rocky View Reads and in our early literacy program focused on students in grades one and two. In addition, staff at Banded Peak continues to individualize programming for each child; respecting their interests, their passions and recognizing where they are in the learning process. To this end efforts are made throughout the school to ensure that students are engaged and supported in their learning. We are encouraged overall by the responses to both Rocky View Schools' Accountability Pillar Survey and Alberta Education's APORI survey related to student success. However, we recognize that there are areas upon which to improve our design. Specifically, in relation to Assessment and the Communication of Student Learning, and those areas related to learners flourishing in a culture of excellence (79.65% n=11).

Overall satisfaction related to assessment practices at Banded Peak remains positive for both students and teachers. On the Rocky View Schools' Accountability Pillar survey 87% of student respondents responded favorably in relation to how their marks are calculated/worked out and 87% in relation to the feedback they receive on assignments. These results represent a slight decrease from the previous school year, but surpass the Rocky View Schools averages of 76% and 78% respectively. Of particular interest is the decrease in student satisfaction as students move through the grades. Students in grade four indicated overwhelming support at 97%, while students in grade eight indicated only 68% satisfaction. Furthermore, parental satisfaction with assessment feedback is low, with 64% (n=11) of parents indicating that they are satisfied with the current assessment practices. This is a drop of 17% over the previous school year and may reflect the introduction of a new report card in the 2014/2015 school year. In addition, 55% (n=11) of respondents are satisfied with the school's ability to keep them informed about their child's progress and achievement. This reflects a drop of 28% over the previous school year.

As a result of the feedback received, we will focus our efforts on ensuring that our assessment practices are increasingly transparent for both parents and for students. This will be accomplished through the introduction of our Parent Portal on PowerSchool, which will allow parents and students to access assessment and performance throughout the school year. In addition, we will begin to pilot a digital portfolio in some grade one/two, three/four and seven/eight classrooms as a means to showcase and share student work. Finally, we will begin to work with parents to improve understanding around the assessment of student learning, the language of assessment, competency based reporting, and specific 21st Century Learning competencies.

Further, to the work related to the communication of student achievement we will focus our attention on improving results related to the culture of excellence at Banded Peak School. Parental satisfaction with the school's ability to enable students to excel and achieve in excellence was lower than anticipated at 79.65% (n=11), when compared to the previous year's high of 91.86%, and a rolling three-year average of 89.25%.

Goal Two – Learners are engaged.

At Banded Peak we provide students engaging, authentic learning experiences, which are designed to empower learners to seek multiple perspectives, problem solve, think critically and arrive at their answers independently. To accomplish these goals teachers are provided access to current professional learning opportunities, collaborative planning time, and access to both school and divisional communities of practice. Teachers are encouraged to approach curriculum instruction from various entry points, ensuring that students are provided a balanced program that includes effective literacy and mathematics programming, inquiry learning and exposure to our natural spaces.

We recognize that while students and teachers play an integral role in our school community, it is important to ensure that parents are engaged in the learning process as well. Parental engagement at Banded Peak is accomplished in a variety of different ways including School Council, Fine Arts Day, coaching sports teams, organizing clubs, and providing expert advice to students/teachers. In addition, through our weekly blog posts, social media, and classroom newsletters we work to engage all parents in the happenings within our school.

Results from both the Rocky View Schools' Accountability Pillar survey and the Alberta Education APORI survey suggest that work related to parental engagement should be a priority area for Banded Peak School. Despite an overall satisfaction rate of 81.2%, parents indicated that they felt that there was limited involvement in their child's education (72.6% n=25). Despite an increase of 5.1% over the previous school year, this result remains slightly below the provincial average of 73.4%. In addition parental satisfaction related to the decisions made within the school was 47% (n=15), 25% lower than the previous survey results. This result is more evident with parents of students in grades four to six, where only 40% were satisfied with their ability to make decisions within the school. These results are echoed in the Rocky View Schools' Accountability survey which suggests that 73% of parents (n=11) are satisfied with their ability to be involved in school decision making and 82% (n=11) of parents are satisfied with the opportunities the school offers for involvement in school activities.

Goal Three – Learners are supported.

At Banded Peak School we support the social, emotional, and learning needs of all students. Through the development of an overarching system, both throughout the school and the school division, students have access to timely, ongoing, and continued support to ensure success. Our Child Development Advisor (CDA) provides support for students throughout the school and works to ensure that their social/emotional needs are identified and supported. In addition, our CDA is charged with programming throughout the school tailored to the needs of students, classrooms, and emergent issues/concerns. Additional supports within the school come by way of our Learning Support Team – comprised of our learning support teachers, classroom assistants, administration, and Rocky View Schools' paraprofessionals. These supports allow Banded Peak to provide judicious, effective programming for all students.

A review of the Rocky View Schools' Accountability Pillar Survey suggests that further consideration be placed on the supports provided to individual learners within the school. Parental satisfaction on the Accountability Survey is markedly lower on the 2014/2015 survey (44% n=11) than it was in previous years. This result reflects a 41% drop over the previous school year and is 36% lower than the Rocky View Schools average for the same year. In addition, 73% of

respondents note that they are satisfied that the needs of their child are met at the school. These results are in contrast to staff response, which suggests a 93% satisfaction with the services provided to students and a student response of 89% satisfaction. In addition, parental response on the APORI survey suggests that many parents, students and teachers are satisfied with the progress made towards supporting all learners within the school. Results note an increase in the level of satisfaction year over year from a low of 81.1% in 2011 to a high of 89.7% in 2015; a number that surpasses the provincial average of 84.2%

These results suggest that while gains have been made in relation to learners being supported, an increased effort in communicating specialized programming may be necessary. In addition, conversations have begun throughout the school related to Response to Intervention (RTI), a model designed to identify and appropriately support every child within the classroom and the introduction of Flexible Literacy Groupings as a means to provide targeted support for all readers in a scaffolded manner.

Areas of Strength:

- Parents, student and teacher survey results acknowledge that the culture at Banded Peak is warm, welcoming and nurturing. Responses range between 100% satisfaction by staff to 97% by students to 100% by parents.
- Students at Banded Peak School continue to respond positively to the opportunity to participate in learning through meaningful, real-life, and authentic experience. Results in this area continue to improve year over year, with a 93% satisfaction this school year when compared to other RVS schools at 79%. These results are consistent throughout the school with satisfaction in grades 5 and 6 at 97% and grade 7 and 8 at 81% and 92% respectively. These results are echoed by parental satisfaction of 100%
- Parental satisfaction with the school's ability to provide students with activities that promote responsible citizenship, volunteerism, and community service remains high at 100%. Additionally, parental satisfaction with the school's ability to model environmentally sustainable practices have continued to increase incrementally to a high of 100% this school year.

- Parental response rate to Rocky View Schools' Accountability survey was lower (n=11) when compared to previous years where response ranged from the mid 30s to a high of 59. We will continue to focus our efforts on improving communication with parents using a variety of digital platforms and media to improve upon our response rate.
- Increased attention will be placed on improving communication with parents and students as it relates to assessment and the communication of student learning (COSL).
- Increase attention will be placed on improving communication as it relates to both assessment of learning and assessment for learning with students in our grade 7 and 8 cohort. Current results indicate that students in grades 4 though 6 are pleased with the level of communication, students in grades 7 (73%) and 8 (68%) are not satisfied.
- Increase parental involvement in decision making within the school. Results suggest that satisfaction has decreased from an average of 89% over previous school years to 73% this school past school year (n=11).
- Assess learning support program in an effort to improve parent perception/satisfaction of program delivery. Results indicate low parental satisfaction at 44%, down from last years 85% and in contrast to RVS survey results of 80% satisfaction.

- Overall target goals for the coming school year are relatively high and reflect the tremendous hard work and effort of our students, teachers, and parent community
- Consistent improvement in the area of professional development is noted by teachers year over year to a high of 100% over the past two years.
- Parental involvement is markedly higher on the APORI survey than noted on the Rocky View Schools' Accountability Pillar survey (n=11)


